Susan Ackerman stated her support regarding closing the school due to the coronavirus.

Moved by Endelman, seconded by Johnson, to approve the recommendations from CDC, IDPH and Governor Reynolds in regards to coronavirus. The following recommendations will be in place: the school will be closed through April 12; classified staff will be paid their normal work hours and must be available as needed; meals will be prepared for students; elementary and high school offices will be opened 8 a.m. to noon on Monday and Friday and 1-5 p.m., on Wednesday, appointments are necessary to enter building for belongings; no activities will be scheduled during the closing and the following resolution:

Resolution – Pandemic Response and Emergency Suspension of Policy

WHEREAS, Iowa Code Ch. 279.8 authorizes local school boards to govern their respective districts, including adopting policies for their own governance; and

WHEREAS the Board may, by formal, action suspend or rescind board policy as deemed necessary, appropriate or in the best interests of the District; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the Unites States declared a national state of emergency and on March 15, 2020 lowa Governor Kim Reynolds recommended closure of all public and private K-12 schools in lowa until April 13, 2020 to contain the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds declared a State of Public Health Disaster Emergency under the authority granted through Iowa Constitution, Art. IV, §§ 1, 8 and lowa Code §§ 29C.6(1), 135.140(6), and 135.144 and directed implementation of the Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management's Iowa Emergency Response Plan in response to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19); and WHEREAS, most hourly non-exempt employees will be unable to report to work due to the District's closure and certified contract employees may be asked to work at remote locations to help provide continuity in educational services;

and

WHEREAS, it fulfills a public purpose to continue to pay District hourly non-exempt employees during this closure to prevent or contain the spread of COVID-19, to promote morale and to help retain current employees following the closure: and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020 the lowa Legislature passed and the Governor signed SF 2408 granting waiver of the instructional time requirements in lowa Code Ch. 279.10 for all public school districts closing before April 12, 2020 in order to prevent or contain the spread of COVID-19; and granting Governor Reynolds the ability to waive instructional time requirements for any public school district which closes on or after April 12, 2020 to prevent or contain the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Iowa Department of Education, which has the authority to establish and interpret graduation requirements, and to oversee other crucial aspects of public education is providing written guidance to Iowa school districts on issues related to COVID -19, including but not limited to student attendance, distance/online learning, high school credit, meal distribution, and other issues; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Butler School Board hereby suspends provisions of its board policies and/or whole policies, as identified by the District Superintendent or designee, if such suspension is necessary to implement written guidance from state or federal agencies relating to containing COVID-19 for the duration identified in the Governor's State of Public Health Emergency declaration of March 17, 2020, or as otherwise determined by the Roard

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the District Superintendent will consult with and report to the Board as feasible and appropriate regarding the emergency closure and efforts to implement written guidance from health and government agencies.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the District Superintendent is authorized to close any school facility without further action by the Board of Directors. Such closure shall continue during the emergency created by the COVID-19 pandemic until such time as the Superintendent, in consultation with appropriate health and government authorities, deems it in the best interests of the District and its students to open schools.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the District Superintendent is authorized, based upon the needs of the District and guidance from health and government agencies, to direct staff assignments during District closures, including but not limited to essential employees who must report to work, employees who may be reassigned, and employees whose services are not needed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ac-

cess to public school grounds and public school buildings of the District may be limited as directed by the Superintendent during District closures.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified, exempt employees will remain employed during the school closure and until the number of days expressed on the contract have been fulfilled, unless otherwise approved by the Board. Days that contracted employees do not report for duty onsite or from a remote location, due to closure, do not constitute a fulfilled contract day except to the extent those days are forgiven by the District.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in light of this District-wide emergency closure, the Board authorizes the Superintendent to place hourly non-exempt employees on paid administrative leave and to continue to pay them for up to four weeks during the period of school closure, and the Board shall reevaluate this authority for any school closure lasting longer than four weeks.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the interest of public health and/or to comply with federal or state health department recommendations or guidance, the Board may limit the number of people who can physically attend Board meetings and may, instead, encourage the public to attend or listen to its open public meetings via Facebook live, via telephone or video conference, live streaming on television and/or the internet and the Board may also limit public comment to written comments

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the board reserves the right to adjust board meeting dates, times, and locations during the district-wide emergency closure in a manner consistent with the Open Meetings law, and notes that any or all board members may attend board meetings electronically as permitted by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that execution of this Resolution is conclusive evidence of the Board's approval of this action and of the authority granted herein. The Board warrants that it has, and at the time of this action had, full power and lawful authority to adopt this instrument. OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS CITY OF SHELL ROCK **EMERGENCY MEETING MINUTES** MARCH 17, 2020

Mayor Larry Young called an emergency meeting of the Shell Rock City Council to order at 7 p.m., in the City Hall with council members Donald Bonzer, Robyn Holden, Michael Klinefelter, Jared Krull, and Garrett Schuldt present. City Attorney Bruce Toenjes, Fire Chief Matt Mohn, 1st Asst. Fire Chief Seth Klobassa, First Responder Crew Chief Dave Green, Library Board President Catherine Avery, Library Director Deb Nieman, and Public Works Director Mike Tellinghuisen were also present.

Motion by Schuldt seconded by Holden to approve the agenda with any additions. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Schuldt seconded by Bonzer to go forward with the emergency council meeting without 24 hours' notice of agenda, because for good cause (the emergency created by the COVID-19 virus) such notice is impossible and impractical. The notice provided was posted by 11 a.m. and the Clarksville Star was notified. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

It was reported that Steve Badger of Steve Badger Real Estate Services has withdrawn his proposal to appraise parcel #1211453043 for the City of Shell Rock to have the ability to apply for a REAP grant with the State of Iowa. Motion by Klinefelter seconded by Holden to hire Daniel Dvorak of Iowa Appraisal & Research Corporation of Des Moines, lowa for a cost of \$2,200 to appraise parcel #1211453043, so that the City of Shell Rock has the ability to apply for a REAP grant with the state of Iowa for the acquisition of this property. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

The Council discussed procedures for holding future meetings while still complying with the President's recommendation that public gatherings be limited to 10 or fewer people, and to protect the health and safety of essential City employees and volunteers. Council Person Holden moved, and Council Person Krull seconded, that the following procedures be used for city meetings until changed by Council: City staff and council be authorized to establish a Zoom videoconference account for future City Council meetings, and meetings involving city staff and other city business. The City Clerk shall be the designated Zoom host for Council meetings. City Hall will be the place from which City electronic communications originate. Public access is provided by a link on the City web site for internet videoconference access (using computers and smartphones), and by a dial-in number for telephone participation. Public access is provided by videoconference and dial-in phone access. The March 23, 2020, Special Council Meeting and the Public Hearing at that meeting shall be conducted by Zoom teleconference. The Council shall hold a brief working session on March 19, 2020, at 7 p.m., solely for the purpose of testing the Zoom teleconference system. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, and Krull. Nays-Klinefelter and Schuldt. Motion carried.

Library Director Deb Nieman and Library Board President Catherine Avery were present and a discussion was held as to whether the Library should be open for only certain services or closed during this COVID-19 virus Pandemic. Motion by Krull seconded by Schuldt that the Library be closed to the public with Library staff providing curb side book pick up and Library staff will be paid regular working hours per recommendation of the Library Board. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Schuldt seconded by Holden to keep all the city park restrooms closed and to not rent out any of the shelter houses until the COVID-19 Pandemic restrictions have been lifted. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Schuldt seconded by Holden to keep the Boyd Memorial Community Building closed and the front door locked as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control. The Library has the ability to use the old Police Station for storage during this Pandemic. The Legion and Legion Auxiliary can use their rooms, but cannot enter other parts of the Boyd Building and the person renting the old City Hall has the ability to use that room. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

There was discussion on late fees and water shut offs for delinquent utility accounts during the COVID-19 virus pandemic. Motion by Klinefelter seconded by Krull to still apply late fees, but to forego water shut offs during this COVID-19 pandemic. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Holden seconded by Schuldt to postpone the city's Spring Clean Up that was scheduled for April 20-22, 2020, until further notice. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Holden seconded by Krull to have City Hall remain open and staffed, but the front door will be locked. Residents may call the clerk's office or email the clerk's office and payments can be put in the outside drop box, mailed, or made online until the COVID-19 pandemic social distancing restrictions are over. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried. Motion by Klinefelter seconded by Schuldt to give the Mayor the authority to hire additional help to provide for the essential functions of the city to continue during this pandemic if the current staff is ill or unable to work. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

Motion by Schuldt seconded by Krull to adjourn at 8:34 p.m. Ayes-Bonzer, Holden, Klinefelter, Krull, and Schuldt. Nays-None. Motion carried.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT IN-FORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the limestone and dolomite of the Devonian aquifer. The Devonian aquifer was determined to be highly susceptible to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide little protection from contamination at the land surface. The Devonian wells will be highly susceptible to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application.
